

Eligibility, Allocation, and Funding Request Datasets.

Result we access here

 Information on which countries and components (three disease areas) are eligible for funding.

Types of Data we find here

 Policy/Eligibility data: Number of eligible countries by disease, allocation amounts for each funding cycle, country income classification.

Advocacy & Accountability Focus

 Policy Influence: Advocating for changes in eligibility criteria or allocation methodology to ensure funding reaches the most vulnerable and high-burden areas effectively.

Financial Insights

Disbursement, Financial Metrics, Budgets, and Expenditures Datasets.

Result we access here

 High-level financial summaries of all active and past grants.

<u>Types of Data we find here</u>

 Financial metrics: Total Signed Amount, Total Committed Amount, Total Disbursed Amount across the portfolio, and budget breakdowns.

Advocacy & Accountability Focus

 Global Financial Oversight: Advocating for efficient and timely disbursement of funds from the Global Fund to implementing countries. Highlighting bottlenecks in pipeline flow.

Annual Results

Annual Results Dataset and Documents.

Result we access here


 The aggregated key programmatic achievements across all implementing countries.

Types of Data we find here

 Programmatic data: Cumulative lives saved, total number of people on ART, total TB cases treated, total ITNs distributed (global totals).

Advocacy & Accountability Focus

 Impact Justification: Using success metrics to demonstrate the Global Fund's value and justify increased funding for future cycles (e.g., "See how many lives were saved with \$X amount.").


